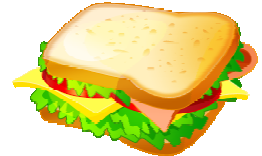

Tuesday Morning Meditation Group continues to meet every Tuesday at 7:30 AM in the Peace Chapel. If you want to experience contemplative prayer ("Prayer of the Heart") please join this group—no prior experience necessary. Silent wordless meditation is an ancient Christian discipline, originating from the third century Desert Fathers. It has been revived in modern times by several Benedictine and Trappist monks and is commonly practiced for 20-30 minutes twice a day in more than 100 countries. Its aim is to open the heart to the divine within and thus support both inner and outer spiritual journeys. All are welcome.

After several months of demolition, including all but the party wall coming down, floor joists are being nailed down and the first floor and walls will be in place soon. In the meanwhile, Sandtown Habitat is gearing up for the annual Build Week (June 21-25) when 150-300 volunteers a-day show up in Sandtown to praise God and raise walls. The Cathedral will be providing lunches the first day of Build Week, June 21st. Sandtown Habitat mourns the loss of our Co-Executive Director, Allan M. Tibbels

It is with much sadness that we announce that Allan M. Tibbels, Co-Executive Director of Sandtown Habitat for Humanity passed away today, Thursday, June 3, 2010.



Mr. Allan, as he was so affectionately known by everyone in our community, devoted his life to Sandtown. Since founding Sandtown Habitat in July of 1989 along with other residents of the community, he has represented many things for those who loved him. He was a loving and devoted husband and father, a visionary, a wise and

patient leader, an advocate for social justice, a spiritual counselor, mentor, friend and neighbor to so many people, and so much more.

His love and compassion for those who have been disenfranchised in our community and throughout the world and his complete faith and trust in God has served as an inspiration for us all.

So, although we are deeply saddened by the loss of our dear friend, it is with great hope, joy and faith that we will continue his legacy as we work to rebuild the community of Sandtown – the community he loved and the community that loved him. We do so with the guidance that he so often leaned on from Job 13:15 that says, “Though he slay me, yet I will hope in him; I will surely defend my ways to his face.” †

Who is My Neighbor (Part 3)?

I attended the Outreach Team's meeting in May to talk about who receives the food pantry items we collect weekly at Incarnation. The food donations are feeding three different groups of people. They all have one need – they're hungry but don't have money to buy food.



Our main focus is to collect food to give to the Church of Guardian Angel's Food Pantry in Remington, and we also provide food to homeless people who sometimes come to the Cathedral during the day asking for something to eat. We also give food to ERICA clients if they request help. But each group's needs are a little different.

The **Guardian Angel Food Pantry** continues to need **tuna fish, noodles and rice, canned fruits and vegetables, soup and crackers, and peanut butter in cans and jars.** Many of

the people who receive these donations are in need of short-term help, but live at home with working kitchens.

The homeless people who come to us may not have a can opener or a microwave oven. When they ask, we try to provide food for 2 or 3 days of meals. To help them, jars with screw top lids and cans with pop top lids in small or single serving sizes would be useful. **Useful items include cans of Vienna sausage, Spam, vegetables and fruits, soup and cereal bars.** Microwave items will not work if the meal cannot be cooked using the stove.

ERICA clients also receive whatever is available from the bins. However, since they often travel long distances, we are discussing other ways to provide assistance so that they don't have to carry groceries with them as they travel.

The Outreach Team talked about how donating food for our neighbors is a spiritual discipline. Jesus told his disciples that the poor would always be with them (John 12:8), and they are still with us. Our role as Christians is to share what we have with others who lack food. As an example of the discipline of sharing, perhaps once a month we could select a can of soup or box of pasta or cereal from our pantries and bring it to church to donate. Younger children could participate by choosing the food to share and which Sunday to make the donation.

As a reminder, if you are traveling and leaving food in your pantry, please remember that food donations frequently fall off while the hunger needs of the communities we serve will continue during the summer months. In particular, many children will not receive some of the meal assistance they get during the school year. Making a donation before you leave will fill the pantry through the summer. Thanks for your help!

Cathedral Advocates for Public Education (CAPE)

CAPE met to review our partnerships with local schools Abbottston Elementary and Waverly Elementary/Middle, and to consider next steps in our advocacy efforts for public education.

CAPE affirmed the importance of our presence in the schools – talking to parents, faculty, and community members, to listen to their needs and to brainstorm how we as a faith community can best respond to those needs. Hadley Mellin, Chair of CAPE, reported on Convention and on the diocesan education priority which urges us to develop “training and strategies for advocating for the poor in education.” We discussed how our school partnerships and our advocacy efforts through CAPE might be a model that we can share as a resource with other congregations. We discussed what this might look like. Some ideas that were shared include canvassing churches to learn about what their school partnerships look like, inviting education advocates to our community for forums, and developing our own adult formation opportunities around public education as a social justice issue.

CAPE also affirmed our advocacy work with the Baltimore Education Coalition, a citywide grassroots organization of schools, community groups, charter schools and education reform advocates with whom we worked this year to protect state funding for City Schools and with whom we will continue to work as we look to protect education funding statewide. Over 90% of Maryland schoolchildren are educated in our public schools, and educational opportunities are limited due to budget cuts throughout the state.

A MESSAGE FROM OUR SENIOR WARDEN

As our program year comes to an end, I would like to reflect on our community's journey before and since Hal's arrival nine months ago, at the end of August 2009.



Dean Gardner gave us almost eight months to say goodbye, after which we had numerous listening sessions and cottage groups, where we were able to hear why members felt our Cathedral community was special and to share our excitement about a new dean. And we realized that as we prepared, we needed to be open to God's call to a new vision, building on the special community that we were, but knowing, at the same time, that things would be different as we moved forward.

About that same time our membership participated in record numbers in a parish survey, in which many said that they would give more time, talent, and treasure if asked. And we counted on that commitment as we looked for a new dean to guide us toward new horizons.

A wonderful group of twelve worked as a search committee, sifting through an enormous number of candidates. And in this exciting process we continued to grow with the help of Erv Brown, our interim dean, who guided us with calm wisdom through this time of change. Equally dedicated, many members worked hard to continue our programs and to sustain our mission.

The new dean, Hal Hayek, arrived with his wonderful family at the end of August, 2009, to a very warm welcome. And we have been moving forward even since. At the November

annual meeting, Dean Hayek outlined his vision and expressed his excitement at beginning his journey with us. And since then we have experienced growth in membership and, most important of all, a renewed commitment from new and existing members of their time, talent, and treasure, enabling us to continue to reach out to the Baltimore community and to increase our efforts to help those in need.

With lively discussions at the Chapter retreat in February, we planned an envisioning process. Since that time our community, the Chapter, and a working group have been moving the process ahead. In the near future the whole community will become a part of the planning, as the Chapter and the Dean complete their work on the process. Almost complete is a brief statement of our vision, our priorities, and our team structure, enabling a full and active discussion across the whole community.

I have now served this congregation in a leadership role for over ten years, and I can honestly say that I have never been more excited about our Incarnation community and the way in which we love and care for one another. (Even when we have had differences, we have listened to each other, respected the thinking and feelings of all, and valued each and every person in our community.) Equally important, if not more so, I am profoundly excited about the way in which we reach out to the least among us—to the poor and the needy.

I am excited for all of us as we move into a summer of planning and a new program year in the fall. We have much to do. And you are needed as we seek to live out God's call to us. I look forward to serving with you another year as your senior warden.
